Vehicles and Veterans Reunited details:

Along with our military vehicles we have invited the Corowa and District Car Club and the Corowa Historic Vehicle and Machinery Club. We are hoping that The Australian Defence Force will bring some vehicles along as in past years.

Requirements while in Ball Park:

The caravan park is a council owned property and the local police patrol this area. People are not allowed to drive unregistered vehicles or machinery and <u>must have a correct licence</u> for driving vehicles in these areas.

Local rules for footpaths: Last year people were seen driving on the new footpaths and this was reported to the council. Please **do not** drive on footpaths.

Vehicle Numbers:

Upon arrival at Corowa you need to go down to Ball Park Caravan Park and register your vehicle. Vehicle numbers will only be given to people with an ex-military vehicle and due to the large numbers of vehicles we are expecting this makes it easier for us to provide a tally of the types and numbers of vehicles at our event. The number must be placed either on the front window or bumper bar of your vehicle. This makes it easier for the organisers to determine if your vehicle has been entered.

Theme vehicles will also receive identification card to put alongside your vehicle number.

The Australian Army Medium Truck Replacement Programme

Introduction

By 1977 the Australian Army's fleet of General Service (GS) 2 1/2 ton and 5 ton International trucks had been in service for about 15 years. The range of International trucks had been chosen in 1960, and on that occasion the army had laid down specifications for the vehicles required, as there were no commercially available vehicles suitable for military use in Australia at the time. Thus, the trucks produced by International were unlike other vehicles on the Australian market, and in fact were the forerunners of the highly successful civilian ACCO range.

However, around this time, the commercial model ceased production and many major components, especially the engines, were no longer in production. This meant that the army, if it wished to keep the range of vehicles in an operational condition, would need to pay for a special production run of major assemblies, assuming that the manufacturer was willing to accept the order. In addition, the maintenance of the fleet was causing increasing problems.

Tenderers

The decision was taken in early 1977 to replace the Internationals, and a briefing was held in Melbourne, Victoria, for representatives of 31 world-wide companies in order to state the army's requirements and to call for tenders for the procurement of evaluation vehicles. The criteria for the programme required that the selected equipments be based on commercial components which were preferably already available to commercial operators. This would mean that the army would have a range of vehicles which had commonality with civilian vehicle and that service and repair parts were widely available round the country.

The Army Staff Requirement was for two types of vehicle:

an all-wheel drive vehicle of three to four tonne payload,

an all--wheel drive vehicle (6 x 6) of eight to ten tonne payload,

Of the tenders received, 32 submissions were in the four tonne range and 25 were in the eight tonne vehicle range. The names of all tenderers were never publicised. In September 1978 the Minister for Defence announced that the government had decided to purchase three vehicles each from five companies. The suppliers of four tonne trucks for the evaluation phase were General Motors Holden Ltd and Mercedes- Benz (Australia) Pty Ltd, and the eight tonne trucks were to be supplied by Thiess Toyota Pty Ltd, Leyland Motor Corporation of Australia, and Mack Trucks Australia. The five companies delivered their vehicles to the army starting in May 1979.

Vehicle types

General Motors Holden supplied Bedford MKP 4 x 4 four tonners for evalua-tion. The MKP was basically the same vehicle as that already in service with the British Army. The civilian MFR/MJR range was already in wide use in Australia, with many all-wheel drive vehicles in service with government, state forest, fire fighting, electricity and water supply authorities. The Bedford was powered by a Vauxhall 8:2 litre diesel engine. In addition to minor alterations to suit the tender, the vehicles had an all-steel drop side body built by Gitsam Transport Engineers of South Australia, complete with canvas canopies.

Mercedes-Benz (Australia) supplied Unimog UL 1700L 4 x 4 four tonne trucks. The Unimog range

had only been available in right-hand drive since 1977, and the UL 1700L was supplied in long wheelbase format to enable the four tonne body to be fitted. While only a few Unimogs were to be found in the Australian civilian scene, they were in widespread European use. The UL 1700L's were fitted with a turbo-charged six-cylinder diesel engine of 5.7 litre capacity producing 124 kW. It is believed the evaluation vehicles were fully imported.



Thiess Toyota supplied Hino Model ZC 121 E 6 x 6 eight tonners. The drive line and cab/chassis were all commercially proven units, and it is believed they were fitted with locally-made bodies. They were powered by a Hino EK 100 six-cylinder diesel engine developing 190 kW.

Leyland Australia provided Leyland Mastiff 6 x 6 eight tonne trucks. The vehicles were built from the ground up at the Leyland Engineering Division in Sydney, with design support coming from the Scammell Division of British Leyland UK. The aluminium bodies of the three trucks were built by Highgate Engineering.

The Mastiffs were powered by Perkins turbo-charged V8 diesels of 160 kW, and were of cab-over-engine configuration.

Mack Trucks Australia provided all-Australian-built vehicles in its RM 6866 RSX range of eight tonne trucks. The vehicles were powered by Mack T13 676 Maxidyne 300 six-cylinder diesel engines producing 212 kW. The bodies were specially designed to army requirements.

Three vehicles from each tenderer made up the test line-up.

In order to identify each vehicle type, the vehicles were marked as follows:

BF for Bedford MB for Mercedes Benz HN for Hino LL for Leyland

Numbers were added to each vehicle according to their particular fittings:

1 was fitted with the EDE 28Volt Alternator

2 was fitted with a winch

3 was fitted with a crane

It is unclear if BF3 and MB3 carried cranes behind the cabin.

The vehicles carried Army Registration Numbers (ARNs) in the range 30538 to 30552.

A reference vehicle was also used by MTTT, which was an International 5 tonne GS vehicle (F1). The International carried the marking RV for Reference Vehicle and had the ARN 176834.

Testing

Following delivery to the army, an exhaustive series of trials was undertaken. Army Office, Canberra, requested management of the trials be undertaken by the Trials Directorate of the Defence Science and Technology Organisation (DSTO).

The objectives of the trials were to establish characteristics and performance of the vehicles in accordance with the Army Staff Requirement; to identify short-comings, advantages and implications of service use; to assess relative costs over the whole of life; and to determine if the vehicles were air-portable in RAAF C-130 aircraft.

The essential characteristics of the vehicles eventually chosen were to be reliability, economy of manpower, ease of maintenance, conformity to State Road Laws, mobility, ergonomics, engine characteristics and engine suppression (for radios).

In order to conduct the user evaluations, a special-purpose unit was raised and based at the Army School of Transport at Puckapunyal, Victoria. The unit was designated Medium Truck Trials Team (MTTT) and comprised 60 soldiers of various corps, commanded by an RACT Major, with a Captain heading the RAEME element. The unit was formed in February 1979 and disbanded in April 1980. The trials unit clocked up to 50,000 km on each of the vehicles over varying terrain and in all-weather conditions including desert (Woomera), snow (Victorian Alps) and jungle (Tully) areas.

Photos of the vehicles on trial at the EDE Proving Ground at Monegeetta, show four of the vehicles on their side as though they had rolled during testing. The Leyland was the only one not seen in the rollover tests (or accidents).

Following an evaluation of the trials results and additional studies, which included examination of price and local content, each of the competitors in the trials was required to re-tender on the basis of production quantities in July 1980.

Eight tonne truck Chosen

The first result was announced in late May 1981 when the Department of Defence awarded an \$86 million contract to Mack Trucks Australia for the supply of 940 eight tonne trucks to the Australian Army. The trucks would be supplied over a five-year period beginning in February 1982. Local content in the contract was over 60%, with local expenditure in the region of \$73 million. The vehicles would be built in the company's plant in Brisbane.

Mack Production Vehicles

The Mack, designated Truck, Heavy, Cargo, Mobility Category 3 (MC3), was the standard vehicle with several derivatives being built, utilising the same cab/chassis. These variants included the standard Cargo Truck, Cargo truck with winch, Cargo truck with crane, Dump truck 8 cubic metre capacity (with and without winch), Water Tanker, Fuel Tanker, Gun Tractor, Ammunition vehicle, Bitumen distributor, Transit concrete mixer and Wrecker.

The gun tractor and ammunition vehicle were to be used as the tractors and support vehicles for the US designed and built M198 155 mm gun. The two equipments were basically similar with a crane in the centre of the load body and the gun tractor having a crew compartment behind (but not connected to) the driver's cabin. The crew compartment had steel head- and tail-boards and a canvas canopy and sides, rather like a tent. Both vehicles were equipped with circular cab roof hatches and are the only vehicles in the Mack range to be so equipped.

The cargo variants were all capable of carrying 10 one tonne pallets on highways at 100km/hr, and eight one tonne pallets cross-country. Ready access, by drop sides, for fork lifts enabled maximum stores movement and minimised the labour requirements. The vehicle could ford up to 0.8 m, and negotiate gradients of 50% and side slopes of 20%.

The water tanker version had one large tank with a capacity of 14,775 litres. It was equipped with pumping equipment and distribution outlets under the tank.

The recovery vehicle mounted a Holmes 750 twin boom wrecker unit. The Holmes unit was mounted close to the rear bogie of the truck, the area between the cabin and the wrecker frame being taken up with tool boxes and equipment storage. Thirty units were supplied. This Wrecker was superseded by the Heavy Recovery Vehicle (HRV).

The first vehicle, Army Registration No 36001, was handed to the army in June 1982. In its first year of military service the Mack underwent further evaluation as a road train. The road train comprised a Mack cargo truck towing two four-wheeled 'dog' trailers, each of which carried laden containers. The all-up weight of the combination was over 45 tonnes and the Macks appeared to be able to handle the load without major problems. Additional trials conducted include the carriage of M113A1 series vehicles on the Mack.

Four Tonne truck Chosen

It was announced in October 1981 the Australian Army would purchase 1295 Mercedes Benz Unimog UL1700L Four tonne trucks valued at \$67 million, with local orders totalling \$25 million. The cab and chassis were imported as CKD packs from the company's German plant, and assembled locally in the Mercedes Benz factory in Mulgrave, Victoria. Australian content included cargo bodies, cranes, tyres, generators, fuel tanks and radiators. The Unimog, or Truck, Cargo, Medium, MC2, was a more agile vehicle than the Mack with greater cross-country performance while maintaining a high road speed. Its use was with first line units which required the superior cross-country performance.

MB Unimog Production Vehicles

The 1295 vehicles ordered include a number of variants, including 858 standard cargo vehicles, which could also used as gun tractors for the 105mm Hamel gun. The remaining vehicles of the contract comprised 287 cargo trucks with winch, 76 cargo trucks with crane and 69 dump trucks with winch. A Medium Recovery Vehicle (MRV) with six-wheel drive was later produced.

The first production Unimog was handed over to the army in October 1982 (bearing the Army Registration No 38001), with the units of the Operational Deployment Force based in Townsville, North Queensland, receiving the priority in issues. As was the case with the Mack, the Unimog was issued on a geographical basis with the old fleet of 2 ½ and 5 tonners being withdrawn from the units to coincide with the issue of the new vehicles.

Conclusion

The purchase of these vehicles gave the Australian Army a much-needed increase in mobility. The vehicles chosen were the best of those selected for trials, and appeared to be the preference of a majority of soldiers involved.

(The basis of this article was that written for Jane's Defence Weekly of 11 February 1984. All photos used were taken by the author during the trials period, generally at Holsworthy and Puckapunyal.)



This AC1 Sentinel 8006 was one of the first Australian Cruiser Tanks built here in Australia to help beat the Japanese if and when they invaded Australia.

The Japanese threat had been looming for several years and in 1940 the Australian government decided that we should build our own tank. It was decided to start with 3 experimental tanks number E1, E2 and E3.

E1 was finished and ready for testing late December 1941 just a few weeks after the Japanese treacherously attacked Pearl Harbour on 7 December 1941. Any doubts that we had about the treacherous intentions of the Japanese attack was demonstrated in 9 weeks' time when they bombed Darwin with more bombs and planes than at Pearl Harbour!

Production of the AC1 started soon after early 1942 and No. 8001 was accepted by the army soon after. As a matter of interest we have the complete axle housing and transmission of 8001 in our workshop. This 3½ ton transmission is chained to the floor and walls together with an E1 steel track sprocket and we are endeavouring to free up 6 rolls of rusty MK5 steel track by winching the steel track around the sprocket with our M816 Wrecker and forklift using lots of diesel and WD40 to free up 50 year old track. Why do I bother? Well it is an engineering challenge which at 92 I still enjoy and it is an important part of Australian Military and engineering history.

So back to saving AC1 No. 8006

Well, I was in the middle of collecting Military Vehicles with the intention of starting The Melbourne Tank Museum, and that's another story, told elsewhere.

It was probably late 1980s on my way up to the Bandiana Disposal Sales at Wodonga that I heard about a tank at Wahgunyah in Victoria.

After a few enquiries I found it behind a suburban house near the Motel. It was just an empty hull with no tracks, turret or engines. It was an empty hull languishing on the wood heap behind this house. After contacting the house owner who was happy to sell the wreck at a reasonable and affordable price, I could see it had done a lot of work as a tractor and it must have been used as spares for another machine later on.


Next problem was how to move it out of the wood heap behind this house? Also how to get it home? And was it a worthwhile project? Was it worth saving? – it didn't even have enough road wheels to tow out of the wood heap. There was no rear section to the hull and part of the side of the hull and floor was missing and no tracks!




As I couldn't afford tank transport costs – the next step was to ask for assistance from a local contractor, Ken Lucas with the correct or near correct equipment to do the job. He had several Grant tanks suitably modified with huge winches that he used to extract large fallen trees from the local rivers. Grant tracks were in short supply all over Australia in the post-war period and a deal was made whereby I would supply a good set of second hand tracks in return for which he would load and transport my tank hull from Wahgunyah to Belgrave South. Also he agreed to lend me an old Blitz crane and winch to extract the hull from behind this house and place it on the roadside for him to load it up later.



It was a long slow and painful trip in the old Blitz at 50 kph from Wangaratta to Wahgunyah. The AC1 tank hull was winched out of its resting place and out onto the road ready for Ken to load up.







The hull remained in our storage yard at Belgrave South for a few years while I was fighting all the bureaucrats for 9 years to all the necessary permits obtain permission to start a Military Museum. Eventually we, that is Pat (my long suffering wife) and I decided to look for a different location to build our museum. An old friend who had become an estate agent helped us to find a suitable site only 3 miles south of our present site where a different Council and better group of bureaucrats welcomed us and so by 1982 we had all the necessary permits and zoning to build our museum, and that's another story.

After we opened the museum in 1993 I was able to start work on restoring AC1 No 8006 Sentinel "unarmoured". The transmission and suspension was okay after fitting a further nine road wheels. The rear section of floor needed replacing together with some rear side armour and also the complete rear armour had been cut out and lost. Consequently the replacement rear armour has a different casting number to the original.

In the mid 1980's I had heard that a couple of men from Yarra Glen had bought an Australian Cruiser tank at Bandiana and driven it home and used it in the bush for logging. When I contacted them they told me that the Puckapunyal Tank Museum had taken it away a while back and placed it in their storage yard as a spare.

After visiting the Yarra Glen loggers, imagine my surprise to find the complete power pack of the three original engines and all accessories such as attached radiators and fan and fuel tanks etc. together with lots of handy parts including mudguards and tool boxes – all a bit second hand but restorable. This AC1 was numbered 8040 and eventually I was able to obtain it for the Melbourne Tank Museum in exchange for a very rare Australian armoured car and also as a matter of interest I was able to buy a Matilda Tank wreck which we restored into a Tank Dozer which is now in the Cairns Australian Armour and Artillery Museum together with 8006 AC1. While on the subject of new homes for AC1 it is probably of interest to a few people that the Yarra Glen AC1 No 8040 was eventually sold off from the Melbourne Tank Museum to Cairns Museum so that they could build a replica of probably the best of the Australian Cruiser series as the AC4 mounting the 17 PDR that was made in quantity by GMH at Fisherman's Bend. The same type of gun was fitted to the Sherman Firefly which was the best of the American tanks in WWII.

The power pack from Yarra Glen was mostly complete and just needed a bit of TLC including new spark plugs and points and the fuel system cleaned out, fan belts and radiator hoses. The transfer case was in very good condition and it was a pleasant surprise to see that the five gears were a nice quiet helical cut type. Also the multiplate clutch on the front of the transfer case was in good working condition. Also the transfer case had provision to direct drive an air compressor and a large generator suitable for fast turret rotation.

The three Cadillac engines in the power pack were in good condition and started up okay after fuel and batteries and more TLC. Once we had the power pack running nicely the complete power pack was lifted back into the hull with our trusty M816 wrecker of Melbourne Workshops origin.

This wrecker had been my wrecker in the 4th/19th Prince of Wales's Light Horse Light Aid Detachment in the 80's.

Next job was to weld up the rear hull section from a different tank hull number H69. This was followed with a turret and 40M gun from tank No. 8040.

Getting back to restoring 8006, next came mudguards and tool and storage bins, mostly copied from rusty relics from Yarra Glen logging. A good set of Grant tracks and road wheels was sourced and fitted together with lights and wiring and a good coat of Drab Olive paint.

The finished AC1 8006 stamped "not armoured" was displayed together with our AC3 rebuilt from a range target at our Melbourne Tank Museum in the late 90's.

We were very proud to be able to save these very rare and historic items in our museum and it was a sad day in 2006 when the whole of the museum exhibits were sold by auction. Altogether 258 lots and as a matter of interest the hull of E1 didn't get a bid and yes that's another story – still ongoing I hope!

Reason for selling after 12 years? Well we were entirely self-funded without any outside help or encouragement. Our annual income barely paid expenses so Pat and I worked to make a living.

The AC1 No. 8006 was sold to an Australian dealer who sold it overseas to Jacques Littlefield's Museum in California. After his death and more selling and manoeuvring the tank finished up at the Cairns Armour and Artillery Museum. The AC3 AH99 was sold at auction to Clive Palmer and was last seen in his storage yard at Elk in Queensland.
